Top 10 questions to ask when providing therapy services at a facility that provides adaptive/therapeutic riding.

- 1. Is there a clear agreement on who is responsible for the equipment involved in the therapy service?
- 2. Is the American Hippotherapy Association's Code of Ethics and terminology currently endorsed by the facility?
- 3. Is equine welfare a distinct value at the facility?
- 4. Does the licensed therapist have complete autonomy in the decision-making for their patients, including frequency of care, discontinuation of care, and documentation?
- 5. Is terminology differentiating between therapy services (e.g., PT/OT/ST/psychotherapy) and adaptive riding used correctly by all individuals employed by or associated with the facility?
- 6. Do all facility communications and marketing materials, especially those involving you as a licensed therapist, follow AHA, Inc. recommended terminology?
- 7. Are there safety protocols and emergency procedures in place for all members of the treatment team within the therapy session and at the facility at large?
- 8. Does the selection of horses currently available for therapy services represent a variety of healthy horses who have been specifically trained to provide consistent medical quality equine movement necessary for therapy.
- 9. Are there training and conditioning protocols in place for horses who are providing medical quality equine movement during therapy sessions
- 10. Is there a clearly defined space for the licensed therapist to provide therapy away from the horse?
